>>> SEPTEMBER WATER SAVING TIPS:

For a refreshing drink, keep a container of tap water in the refrigerator instead of running the tap waiting for it to cool down. This helps conserve water and ensures you always have chilled water ready. Remember to use a clean, safe drinking bottle when storing water in the fridge.



>>> Curious Minds Want to Know Enjoy the question of the month

Question:

How long does it typically take for a "Boil Water Order" to be lifted after it's issued?

Answer:

Lifting a boil water notice is not based on a specific timeframe but rather on ensuring the water is safe. After a boil order or similar advisory is issued, water providers must conduct frequent testing at multiple points within the system. The water must be free of contaminants for at least 36 consecutive hours before the notice can be lifted. This process may vary in length depending on the type and extent of contamination. For example, ongoing challenges like earthquake aftershocks causing further pipe damage can prolong the duration of the boil order. The safety of the water supply is the priority in determining when it is safe to lift the notice, as emphasized by the State Water Resources Control Board.

CIRP UPDATE




The District initiated the Capital Improvement Replacement Program (CIRP) in 2019, showcasing a dedication to maintaining the District's infrastructure.

JULY 2024 ACTIVITY

The Belmont II pipeline project began:

- Door hangers were distributed to customers included in this phase of the project.
- Road grading for the installation process started.
- Started bolting valves to tees for intersections and hydrant laterals.
- Identified old water mains and services to avoid damaging underground pipes during excavation.
- Installation of new CPVC lines to the analyzers.





GARDENING TIPS FOR YOUR DESERT-SMART LANDSCAPE:

- Water before 9AM or after 6PM. Water one less day a week to reduce your water bill
- Walk irrigation lines to check for clogs, leaks, and breaks
- Deadhead spent flowers, trim off dead flowering stems (save seeds for replanting)
- Continue deep watering trees and shrubs once a month
- Keep adding to mulches to conserve water, keep soil and roots cool, and reduce frequency of watering

HISTORIC USES OF MEDITERRANEAN / EUROPEAN FAN PALM

The husk (higa) is eaten in southern Spain, the fruits in Morocco and the young suckers in Italy. In Algeria, the spadices and the heart of the palm are used to treat several disorders of the digestive tract, whereas the leaves are used in Morocco and Algeria for the treatment of diabetes, and the fruits used in several countries as an astringent agent due to their bitterness.

Water for Emergencies

Tape this sheet to the inside of a closet or cupboard door for when you need it!

Take the time NOW to review and restock your emergency water supply. Store a minimum of one gallon per person per day for 3 days. Store more if possible. You'll need water for drinking, preparing food, hygiene, and pets.

- For emergency supply, commercially bottled water is recommended.
- If you are preparing your own containers, you can purchase food-grade water containers from camping supply stores. If you want to re-use containers, two-liter plastic soft drink bottles are a good choice.
- Don't use containers that have been used for milk or fruit juice.
- Don't use glass containers--they are heavy and may break.
- Clean the plastic containers with dishwashing soap and water and rinse well.
- Sanitize the bottles with a mix of 1 teaspoon unscented regular liquid bleach to 1 quart of water; swish the bottles, then rinse thoroughly.
- Fill to the top with tap water and tightly twist on the original cap—avoid touching the inside of the cap before putting it on. Write the date on the container. Store in a cool dark place. Do not store directly on concrete (leaching chemicals destroy plastic).
- The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) recommends replacing water every six months (if not using commercially bottled water.) Observe / disinfect water in commercially packaged bottles if past their expiration date.
- If stored water is warm, cloudy, or has debris floating within, disinfect the stored water to prevent illness.

HOW TO DISINFECT WATER

#1 Boil water to make it safe.

This is the <u>preferred</u> method to assure that the water is safe to drink. Boiling water will kill most types of disease-causing organisms that may be present. First, boil the water for one minute. Let it cool, then store in clean containers with covers.

#2 Disinfect with bleach (use *fresh*, unscented, regular household bleach from a new bottle). Add 1/8 teaspoonful (8 drops) for each gallon of clear water, or 1/4 teaspoonful (16 drops) per gallon of cloudy water. Stir well. Let it stand for 30 minutes before you use it. A chlorine-like taste and odor will result *at first*, indicating disinfection has taken place.

#3. Water disinfection tablets may be used by following the manufacturer's instructions.

Extra Water Sources:

Use: Water heater water, water in water pipes, or ice cubes in freezer.

Don't Use: Water from toilet tanks or bowls, swimming pools or spas, or water beds.


Remember: If you don't know if your tap water is safe in a disaster, play it safe and disinfect it automatically until you've been reassured and told it is safe to drink by the authorities.
